


Action Plan and Targets:

Enrollment

The enrollment of beneficiaries in the JSS Portal stands as a pivotal activity undertaken by the dedicated staff of JSS Mamit. This process involves the systematic registration of individuals into the portal database, which serves as a centralized platform for managing and tracking beneficiary information, program participation, and progress.

The staff of JSS Mamit actively engages in the enrollment process, which begins with the collection of pertinent details and data from prospective beneficiaries. This information typically includes personal details, contact information, educational background, skills, and employment history, among other relevant demographics. By gathering comprehensive data, JSS ensures a thorough understanding of the beneficiary base and their specific needs and aspirations.

Central to the enrollment and update process is the JSS Portal, a sophisticated digital platform designed to streamline data management and facilitate efficient communication and coordination. Staff members utilize the portal's features to input, review, and maintain beneficiary records, ensuring accuracy, integrity, and accessibility of information.


Monitoring of all training centers and sub-training centers in the district

The monitoring of all sub-training centers under JSS Mamit is undertaken by the staff of JSS on a periodic basis. This process involves systematic oversight and evaluation of the various training centers operating under the purview of JSS Mamit, ensuring adherence to quality standards, program effectiveness, and alignment with organizational objectives.

Staff members of JSS Mamit engage in proactive monitoring activities to assess the performance, progress, and compliance of sub-training centers with established guidelines and protocols. This monitoring is conducted periodically, allowing for regular feedback, support, and intervention as necessary to optimize operations and outcomes.

Assessment

Following the conclusion of each training batch, the staff at JSS Mamit diligently undertake the critical task of conducting assessments. These assessments serve as pivotal checkpoints in evaluating the efficacy and impact of the training programs offered. The process is meticulously structured to ensure comprehensive evaluation across various dimensions.

Subsequent to the assessment, the collected data, including maksheets and geotagged photographs, are meticulously uploaded onto the JSS Portal. This centralized platform serves as a repository for storing, managing, and analyzing assessment data.













Besides the JSS scheme, JSS Mamit actively participates in other skill development initiatives such as SANKALP (Skill Acquisition and Knowledge Awareness for Livelihood Promotion) and DAY-NULM (Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana National Urban Livelihoods Mission), also Skill development project uner Aspirational District Pragramme. These programs are integral to JSS Mamit's efforts to empower individuals and communities through skill enhancement and livelihood promotion.

SANKALP (Skill Acquisition and Knowledge Awareness for Livelihood Promotion)

The collaboration between JSS Mamit, the District Horticulture Department, and the Mission Foundation Movement and Deputy Commissioner Office, Mamit, resulted in the implementation of a Bamboo Handicraft Craft project at the JSS Training Centre in Mamit on 13 th March, famong 20 beneficiaries. THIS project, aimed to empower individuals through skill development and livelihood promotion, particularly focusing on the art of bamboo handicrafts. Here's a detailed elaboration on the project.





Deen Dayal Antyodaya Yojana - National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NULM)

The collaboration between JSS Mamit, the Urban Development & Poverty Alleviation (UD&PA) department in Mamit, and the Mission Foundation Movement resulted in the implementation of a project under the Deen Dayal Antyodaya Yojana - National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NULM) from 17th August, 2023. This project aimed to provide skill development opportunities to individuals in the urban areas, specifically offering courses in Baking Technician and Self-Employed Tailor at the JSS Training Centre.

Through skill development initiatives like the Baking Technician and Self-Employed Tailor courses, individuals are empowered to pursue sustainable livelihoods, contribute to the local economy, and realize their full potential in urban communities.





Skill Hub Initiative (PMKVY 4.0)

The Skill Hub Initiative (PMKVY 4.0) implemented at JSS Mamit from 22nd March, 2023, under the guidance of the National Skill Development Council, is a significant step towards fostering skill development and enhancing employability in the region. This initiative aims to equip individuals with the necessary skills and competencies to excel in the following job roles.

Small Poultry Farmer: Participants receive training in poultry farming techniques, including poultry management, feed formulation, disease control, and business management practices related to small-scale poultry farming.

Nail Technician: Participants acquire skills in nail care, manicure, pedicure, nail art techniques, sanitation and hygiene practices, and customer service skills essential for working in beauty salons or offering freelance services.

Electrical Technician: Participants undergo training in electrical systems, including electrical installations, maintenance, repair, troubleshooting, safety protocols, and compliance with electrical codes and regulations.

Pickle Making Technician: Participants learn the art of pickle making, including selection of ingredients, preparation techniques.









Sub-Training Centers: (FY 2022-23)

JSS Mamit carried out 11 job roles which operates in main- centre and 16 sub-training centers within the district, spread across three RD Blocks. These centers focus on diverse trades, including:

Lalrampari d/o Rothianga, Lungsir, Mamit who once was a private school teacher decided to enrol in the nail technician program at Jan Shikshan Sansthan in Mamit was a wise one. Through the program, Lalrampari learned all the essential skills required to become a nail technician. She

honed her craft and developed her own unique style, which set her apart from others in the field. With her newly acquired skills, Lalrampari started her own business

providing home service to clients. The demand for her services was high, and she was soon making anywhere from Rs 500 to Rs 4000 per day. Lalrampari's success has not only improved her own financial situation but has also inspired other women in her community which gave them the desired to practice the same.




2. Mrs. Lalnunpuii:

What's even more remarkable in that he extends his expertise to others, providing employment opportunities by allowing them to work in his workshop and



offering a daily salary of Rs. 500. He loves to explore his skills to a person who was interested in this two-wheeler mechanic sector. His success story demonstrates the power of pursuing one's passion and skill development.

5. Miss Lalbiaksiami:



A 21-year-old with a passion for baking trained at the Jan Shikshan Sansthan, she became a Baking Technician. With dedication and creativity, she turned orders for cakes and pastries into a thriving business, earning Rs500 to Rs1000 per order from two to three orders

daily, she grew into an inspiration for her community, proving that following one's passion can lead to both financial success and personal fulfilment.



6. Lalneihthangi:

Her dedication to pursuing a course in Beauty and Wellness under Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Mamit and the guidance of Trainer Miss Zoramsangzuali has evidently paid off.
