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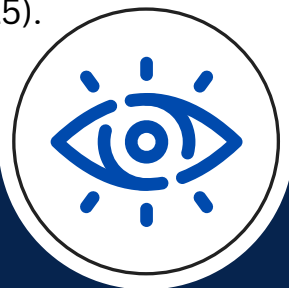
ABOUT MISSION FOUNDATION MOVEMENT

MFM bridges communities, institutions, and opportunities—delivering scalable, impact-driven development through integrated partnerships.

Community Health Clinic, Khamrang

The 10-bedded hospital at Khamrang serves as a vital centre for healthcare in Khamrang and nearby villages. It provides essential medical care to over 3,000 people in an area where access to hospitals and PHCs remains challenging. The hospital team also undertakes health awareness drives across nearby communities. The facility is staffed by two nurses, with doctors visiting on a regular basis.

The hospital was established in 2012 with approval from the Health Department, Government of Mizoram. A new building was later constructed with funding from the Embassy of Japan in New Delhi. It was inaugurated on 4 April 2016 by Mr Akio Isomata, then Economic Minister at the Embassy of Japan, together with the Chief Minister of Mizoram. Since 2017, the hospital's maintenance is supported by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs.

MOBILE DISPENSARY AT MAMIT

FUNDED BY MINISTRY OF TRIBAL AFFAIRS

Under the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, MFM received a grant-in-aid to operate a Mobile Dispensary aimed at improving healthcare access for tribal and remote communities.

This support enables the organisation to deliver basic medical services directly to areas where regular healthcare facilities are limited or difficult to reach, thereby addressing critical gaps in primary healthcare delivery.

Staff and students from MFM School of Nursing and Laithangpuii College of Pharmacy, together with medical doctors, regularly organise and conduct free medical clinics in some of the most remote and hard-to-reach villages of Mamit District.

In addition to the Mobile Dispensary, in 2025 Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) designated for Mamit District was officially flagged off by Health & Family Welfare Minister, Pi Lalrinpuii.

The unit is built on a Tata Yodha pickup, costing around ₹12 lakh, and fitted with a fully equipped medical examination cabin. It is stocked with an X-ray machine and various testing equipment worth over ₹26 lakh, and includes essential support staff.

The Mobile Medical Unit will serve remote villages across Mamit District where access to doctors and healthcare services is limited. With a dedicated team comprising a doctor, nurse, and medical staff, the MMU will travel to these villages to provide medical consultations and also create awareness on various central government social protection and health insurance schemes.

The MMU was funded through the CSR initiative of TATA AIG General Insurance Company Ltd., in collaboration with Swasti – The Health Catalyst with Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) serving as the Implementing Agency.

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SKILL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING ON HEALTH CARE SECTOR

GENERAL DUTY ASSISTANT (GDA)/ CAREGIVER TRAINING



MFM has been actively involved in training healthcare providers throughout Mizoram. The organisation has delivered free General Duty Assistant (GDA) courses for members of the Mizoram Building & Other Construction Workers Welfare Board and for rural candidates under the NABARD NABSKILL programme. Alongside this, MFM runs paid GDA courses with an intake of 30 students per batch at the MFM Skill Training Centre in Dawrpui Vengthar. In response to the growing demand for caregivers, MFM plans to launch free caregiver training programmes in Saitual, Lunglei, Mamit, and Champhai districts in 2026, with support from the Social Welfare Department of Mizoram.

Placement Linked Skill Development Training Programme

Under Mizoram Building & Other Construction Workers Welfare Board (MBOCWWB), LESDE Department, Government of Mizoram, Family members of workers registered under MBOCWWB are being offered a three-month, free, placement-linked training programme in General Duty Assistant (GDA) and Geriatric Caregiving, implemented by Mission Foundation Movement (MFM).

The programme is conducted in Aizawl with 60 trainees in each job role. To ensure a supportive learning environment, free accommodation is provided at MFM Villa, Durtlang, while training is delivered at the MFM Skill Training Centre, Dawrpui.

This initiative reflects the Board's commitment to the holistic development and welfare of its registered workers and their families. Two batches have successfully completed the training, and the third batch is currently underway.

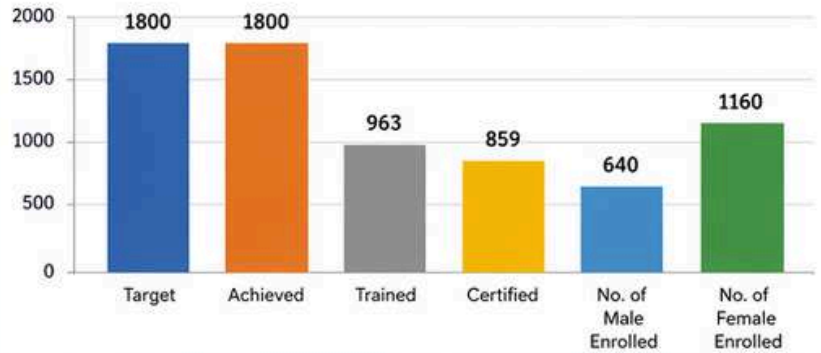

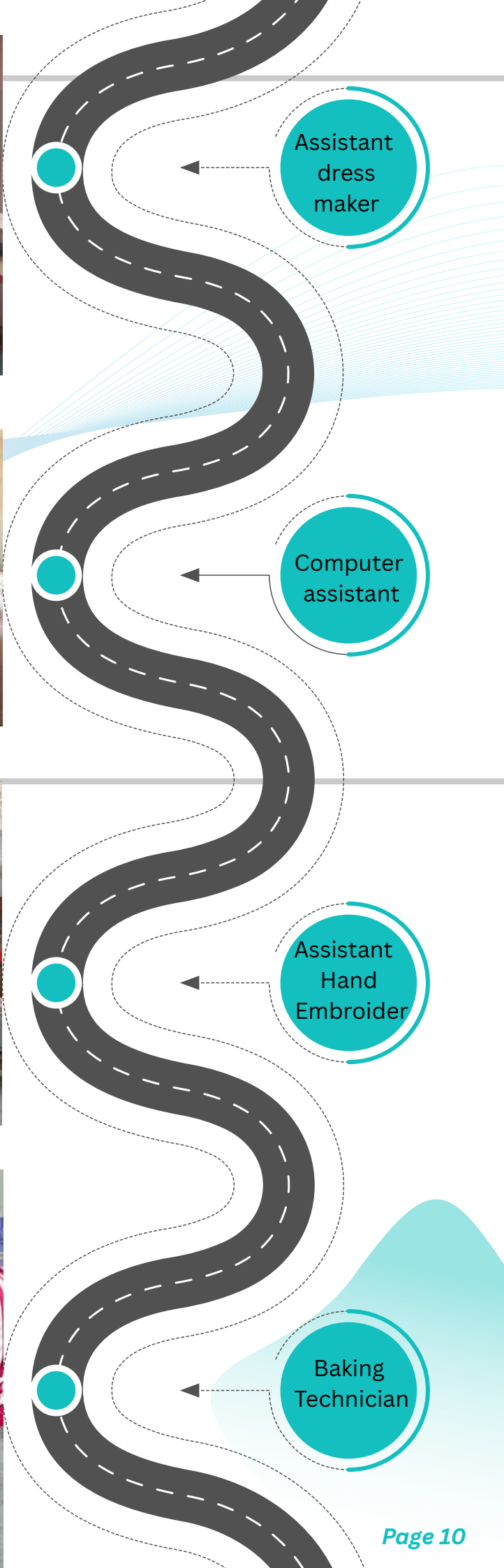

- Chow Chow (Chayote) was once produced in large quantities in Sihphir, Durtlang, and Lungdai.
- It was even exported outside the state, providing livelihoods for many families.
- However, over the past ten years, Chow Chow production has gradually declined.



In recent times, production has reached an almost critical level.

ABOUT THE STUDY

Bal (taro) is a commonly consumed food among the Mizo community. It is widely believed that, in addition to its nutritional benefits, it helps enhance breast milk production.

Recognising the need to scientifically examine and validate this belief, Mission Foundation Movement initiated the research study.



KEY FINDINGS OF THE STUDY

- Identified important phytochemical constituents present in *Colocasia esculenta* (taro).
- Scientifically evaluated the galactagogue (properties that help promote breast milk production) potential of taro.
- Determined the nutritive value of taro.
- Findings support the traditional belief and highlight the health benefits of taro.
- Provides scientific evidence for the nutritional and functional importance of taro.

HEALTH MINISTER'S REMARKS

- Encouraging to see a scientific study conducted on bal (taro), a widely consumed traditional Mizo food.
- Appreciated the efforts of those involved in the research.
- Taro is deeply rooted in Mizo culture, and its benefits are commonly known.
- Scientifically validating these properties through research adds great value.
- Findings could be effectively highlighted through proper packaging and marketing, showcasing its nutritional value.

MFM School of Nursing, established in 2009, operates with the approval of both the Indian Nursing Council (INC) and the Mizoram Nursing Council (MNC). In 2024, the institution was upgraded to offer the General Nursing & Midwifery (GNM) programme. The school currently admits 20 students per batch in Auxiliary Nurse Midwifery (ANM) and 30 students in GNM.

The institution is dedicated to addressing the healthcare needs of individuals, communities, and the nation at large. It provides a strong academic and practical foundation for advanced nursing education and specialization. At the same time, it fosters the personal and professional development of its students, preparing them to contribute meaningfully to society as responsible individuals, citizens, and healthcare professionals.

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INDIA COLLABORATION (IC)

Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) successfully implemented the project “Prevention of Drug Abuse among Youth in Mizoram” to address substance abuse through a holistic, community-based, and faith-driven approach. The project focused on prevention, counselling, rehabilitation support, and livelihood development for vulnerable youth.

The programme exceeded several targets, reaching 445 individuals through community outreach against a target of 400, and conducting awareness programmes in 20 schools against a target of 15. A total of 197 individuals received psychological and spiritual counselling, while one-on-one case management strengthened recovery pathways.

Faith-based interventions, including prayer support and a Transformational Gospel Camp for 49 participants, promoted emotional healing, hope, and resilience. Recreational activities and group discussions for 80 participants further enhanced peer support and wellbeing.

A key livelihood component was the 31-day bakery skill training, where 50 participants gained practical skills and confidence for reintegration and income generation.

The project demonstrated that combining counselling, outreach, spiritual care, and skill development is an effective model for drug prevention and recovery. It has created a strong foundation for future scale-up with stronger aftercare and sustainable livelihood support.



MOBIUS YOUNG CLIMATE LEADERS FOR HIMALAYAN DEVELOPMENT, NORTH EAST INDIA



Following the successful implementation in Nagaland by YouthNet under the guidance of Climate Studies and Knowledge Solution Centre, Govt. of Nagaland, the project was expanded to other North Eastern states, including Mizoram. In Mizoram, the project commenced in May 2025 and is implemented by Mission Foundation Movement with support from Mobius Foundation.

SAPCC-BASED RESEARCH

Study titled 'Assessment of Household Waste Collection and Management Practices in Aizawl in the context of Mizoram's SAPCC 2030 Targets' conducted based on State Action Plan on Climate Change (SAPCC).

- Assessed household waste collection systems, community participation, challenges in urban waste management and feasibility of 100% door-to-door waste collection.
- Covered 271 households across multiple localities.
- Findings: Waste generation low to moderate and awareness high; however, irregular collection, limited manpower and infrastructural gaps remain key challenges.
- Strengthening coordination, improving collection systems (especially pilot door-to-door collection) and addressing resource constraints are essential for sustainable waste management.

- Building linkages with government bodies, institutions, and communities

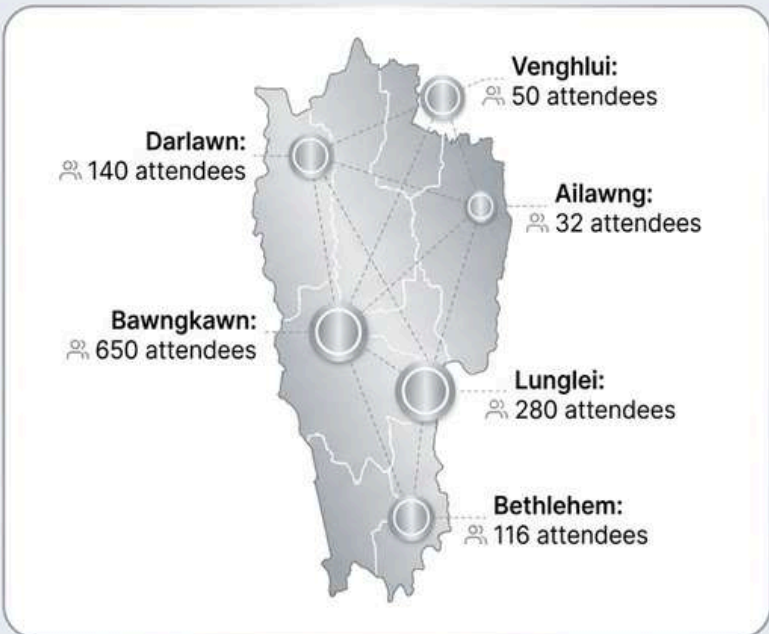

The Youth Wellness Campaign was successfully conducted across three locations in the Aizawl area in collaboration with local YMA units, focusing on promoting holistic well-being among young people.

The campaign commenced at Electric Veng on 20th September, engaging 80 youths and young adults in an interactive and impactful programme. It continued at Ramhlun Vengthar on 2nd October, where 72 participants actively took part in the sessions. The final phase was held at Zemabawk South on 4th October, with 67 participants from the locality.

Through meaningful discussions, awareness sessions, and community engagement, the campaign created a positive platform for youth to reflect, learn, and strengthen their overall well-being, encouraging healthier and more purposeful lifestyles.

SMILE Project was launched on 9th October 2026 at ATI Auditorium, MINECO, Aizawl, by Pi Lalrinpui, Hon'ble Minister in charge of the Social Welfare Department. The initiative aims to support economically disadvantaged and vulnerable individuals in securing sustainable livelihoods.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between the Office of the Deputy Commissioner, Aizawl, and Mission Foundation Movement (MFM), marking the formal commencement of the project.

The Deputy Commissioner of Aizawl serves as the Implementing Authority, while Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) has been appointed as the Implementing Agency. The project focuses on facilitating access to Central and State Government welfare schemes, along with support in education, healthcare, and skill development to enhance employability and self-reliance.

The Hulhliap Short Stay After Care Skill Training Programme is a targeted initiative aimed at empowering individuals transitioning from rehabilitation and short stay care into sustainable livelihoods.

It is Implemented under the SANKALP framework through LESDE, with Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) as the training provider, the programme focuses on industry-relevant skills such as Assistant Electrician, Aluminium Fabrication, and Food Processing. It mainly emphasizes on employability, rehabilitation support, and long-term socio-economic reintegration.





GBV SOLVE PROJECT

Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) launched Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Solve Project on 6th November 2025 with support from Aparajita and the J-PAL South Asia team. The initiative works to raise community awareness, strengthen response systems, and support survivors of gender-based violence through education, counselling, and livelihood opportunities.

Out of 470 proposals submitted across India, only five organizations were selected, and Mission Foundation Movement was chosen to implement the programme in Mizoram. The two-year initiative is being carried out in Tlangnuam and Darlawn Blocks of Aizawl District in partnership with the Department of Women and Child Development, schools, churches, community organizations, and local and village councils.

The programme brings together prevention and rehabilitation through coordinated, community-led action across the two target blocks.

A. Prevention and Awareness

- School-based awareness sessions
- Self-defense training at school
- Community awareness campaigns
- Engagement with church youth groups
- Capacity building for frontline workers

B. Rehabilitation and Support

- Skill development support for survivors
- Confidential, trauma-informed counselling services

Roundtable Consultation on Enabling Sustainable Livelihoods in Mizoram

Mission Foundation Movement (MFM) hosted a Roundtable Consultation on Enabling Sustainable Livelihoods in Mizoram at the ATI Auditorium, MINECO, on 4th November. The event was jointly organised in collaboration with the Bharat Rural Livelihoods Foundation (BRLF), the Rural Development Department, Government of Mizoram, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and Mizoram University.

The consultation brought together key stakeholders to deliberate on strategies for promoting sustainable livelihood opportunities and strengthening rural development across the state. The discussions focused on enhancing community-based approaches, improving access to resources, and fostering long-term economic resilience.

Prof. Lalnilawma, Hon'ble Minister of Rural Development, attended the programme as the Chief Guest. The event was also graced by Dr. K.C. Lalmalsawmzauva, Adviser to the Chief Minister (Handholding), along with distinguished representatives from partner organisations, including Mr. Himangshu Das, Programme Officer, BRLF, and Dr. Aruna Pandey, Head – Research & MEL, BRLF, as well as other officials and experts.

The consultation served as an important platform for knowledge exchange, collaboration, and policy dialogue aimed at advancing sustainable and inclusive livelihood development in Mizoram.

The We Foundation

Mission Foundation Movement (MFM), in collaboration with WE Foundation, a Kolkata-based NGO, initiated the project “Punarnava: Free Cancer Screening and Prevention Initiative for Underprivileged Women.” The project aims to improve access to preventive healthcare services for economically disadvantaged and underserved women, with a primary focus on cervical cancer screening, early detection, awareness generation, and timely referral for treatment.

The initiative seeks to address major barriers faced by vulnerable women in accessing regular health check-ups and cancer screening services. Through this programme, women are educated on the importance of preventive healthcare, early symptoms of cancer, personal hygiene, nutrition, and routine medical screening. As part of the implementation process, a comprehensive baseline health survey was conducted among women aged 16 to 70 years. The survey included measurement of height, weight, blood pressure, and blood sugar levels, along with collection of relevant medical history and health risk factors to assess the overall wellbeing of beneficiaries.

The project has successfully screened 2,500 women, creating a strong foundation for future diagnostic camps, referrals, follow-up care, and expanded women’s health interventions. This collaboration reflects MFM’s continued commitment to promoting health equity, preventive care, and improved quality of life for women in underserved communities
